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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

INTRODUCTION

As we entered 2022-23, we were all still experiencing a high amount of disruption caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, which continued to provide many challenges for both us and the Kidney Community across Wales.

However, thanks to the ongoing support that we received, and the strong partnerships we have built upon, we were able to reach and support more people than we have done in a long while, continue to diversify our income streams, and significantly work to reduce our overheads, whilst ensuring the largest percentage of our organisation spend went directly on our support services.

As I complete my second year in post with Kidney Wales, the passion and motivation for what we are trying to achieve has grown even more so than the previous year. Some stand out achievements for me over this year are delivering over £18,000 of financial support to those most at need, partnering with Kidney Care UK and investing a further £65,000 into research for Wales, securing £150,000 from the National Lottery People and places scheme to grow our volunteering and community engagement, increasing the amount of support we are offering those who come to us when in need and ending the year in a financially better position than expected. I could not be prouder of what the team has been able to achieve, during 2022-23, not least because we have been faced with so many unexpected and emotional challenges through the year, but because we have also been operating at a reduced staffing capacity.

As an organisation and as a group of individuals we were deeply saddened and shocked by the passing of a member of the team, Brett Dowds, and a member of our Board of Trustees Stewart Humphreys. Both Stewart and Brett were much loved, and respected individuals within the Kidney Community. They will be sorely missed by all of us here at Kidney Wales.

Finally, I would like to thank all of our supporters, the staffing team, our volunteers and the organisations we work closely with. I am so proud of the collective efforts we are making and the work we have achieved and will continue to achieve together, to support the Kidney Community across all of Wales.

Chair's Statement

As we began to emerge from the pandemic, the 2022/23 financial year has been characterised by cost-of-living increases that have disproportionately impacted on people living with kidney disease.

The focus of Kidney Wales has been to work in partnership with other charities and the public sector to make every pound of investment go further to alleviate the acute challenges of today, as well as to strive for a more hopeful future for treatment options.

Our partnership with Renal Social Workers has enabled food vouchers and financial assistance to be targeted at those most in need. We have brokered access to expert advice and reductions to household bills via third parties. Through a grant from Anglesey County Council, energy bills have been reduced for patients who undertake lifesaving dialysis treatment at home. While two research projects, co-funded with Kidney Research UK, are expanding our understanding of how to optimise health outcomes for people with kidney disease.

Finding effective and creative ways to proactively address the challenges faced by the Welsh Kidney Community has galvanised our dedicated team of staff, trustees and supporters to continue to deliver impactful services that improve the lives of people affected by kidney disease.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The charitable objects of Kidney Wales are the relief of the physical and mental health of persons who are suffering from renal disease or diseases in Wales or elsewhere in Great Britain as the Trustees from time to time decide, including but not limited to:

- i. The promotion, provision, maintenance and improvement of renal units in hospitals and kidney transplant units, schools of medicine, universities and other such locations.
- ii . Providing support, education and practical advice.
- iii. Advancing the education of the general public in all areas relating to renal diseases; and
- iv. The promotion or provision of other effective care and support for people who are affected by renal disease.

Vision Mission

Our vision is to unite the Welsh kidney community to enable pioneering world class care, support and well-being services.

The mission of our work is to generate and use diverse resources sustainably and responsibly to:

- 1. Deliver education and awareness raising activity.
- 2. Work in partnership with other organisations to enhance the experience and well-being of the kidney community.
- 3. Invest our funds in support services and enhancing facilities and equipment to add value to statutory funding and improve patient care and well-being.
- 4. Develop innovative programmes in research for the benefit of kidney patients in the Welsh community.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities

1. Deliver education and awareness raising activity.

For this year we were able to increase the amount of education and awareness raising activity that we delivered, and the focus of this was based on financially related queries, being the most received by our Patient Information and support manager. Through this insight we designed and delivered a series of four Let's Talk- cost of living sessions online.

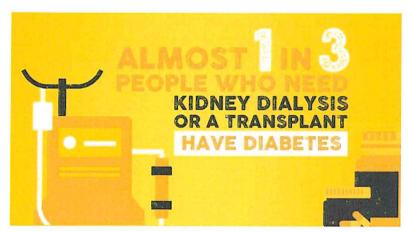

We continued to embed and establish our Volunteer Ambassador programme which had been started the year before. Our 30 ambassadors were able to organise and deliver over 20 talks to a variety of different organisations across the year.



As part of the Kidney Charities together group we were able to help deliver an increased awareness raising campaign for World Kidney Day 2023. A campaign that was delivered primarily through social media and online platforms, and was used to educate the general public so that they could learn how kidney disease could affect them, and what a devastating impact it can have on those living with Kidney disease. This year's campaign saw increased engagement across all social media platforms for the messages that were shared.



In the lead up to World Kidney Day 2023, we held our first in person event at the Senedd, since the start of the pandemic. We were grateful to have the event sponsored by Jayne Bryant MS, allowing us to raise awareness of kidney disease, and the impact it has on those living with it, amongst members of all the political parties in Wales.

2. Work in partnership with other organisations to enhance the experience and well-being of the Kidney Community

We are simply unable to tackle the challenges of CKD on our own, and therefore we are massively thankful of the many other organisations that we work with, including Kidney Research UK, Kidney Care UK, Popham Support, PKD, NKF and others. We are also thankful of our strong relationships with the NHS in Wales, and the Welsh Kidney Network.

We continued to attend and contribute to the collaborative group consisting of ourselves, Kidney Care UK, Popham Support and NHS colleagues. Together we were able to produce a number of Covid-19 newsletters during the year, and delivered a webinar entitled "Helping Households to Save Money & Reduce Costs", in response to the cost-of-living crisis. The collaborative group has also been able to help colleagues in the NHS, establish a new Welsh Kidney Network patient group, where the Chair will sit on the Welsh Kidney group itself, and represent the voice of Kidney Patients as a whole.



We continued to create new partnerships during the year and were proud to be supporting health and wellbeing for kidney patients by donating £4,000 to Kidney Beam. This money will help to fund 1-year memberships for kidney patients living in Wales allowing access to the benefits of Kidney Beam.

What is Kidney Beam?

Beam Kidney Disease, affectionately known as Kidney Beam, is an online exercise, education and wellbeing platform for people with kidney disease. We offer progressive programmes, live and on-demand classes, and community and motivational support. We aim to improve self-management skills, community connections, and physical and emotional health.

All our sessions are led by specialist instructors either living with or working in kidney disease, and are tailored to different interests, health needs and stages of disease. We host a variety of exercise classes including strength training, yoga, Pilates, dance, and cardio fitness; and address needs such as regulating blood pressure, diabetes management and mobility, as well relaxation, pain management, and bone density improvement.

At Kidney Wales we know that those living with CKD have challenges that extend beyond their health, and this has been even more evident as the cost of living crisis has taken hold. Because of this our Patient Information and Support Manager has worked hard to collaborate with a number of other organisations to, allowing easy signposting and referrals to be made so that members of the kidney community can get the support they need in a timely manner.

3. Invest our funds in support services and enhancing facilities and equipment to add value to statutory funding and improve patient care and well-being

The cost-of-living crisis has hit those living with CKD in Wales hard. Those living with CKD are likely to experience increased costs for heating and a kidney-friendly diet, whilst at the same time transport to and from multiple medical appointments for dialysis patients is also incredibly costly.

We are all too aware of these financial challenges that exist for those within the Kidney Community, and for this year we have continued to offer Financial Assistance where needed.



A total of £13,199 of financial assistance grants were awarded to 49 patients over the past 12-month period. These grants fall under 4 main categories, Household goods, Household Repairs, Rent/Bills and Technology.



We also introduced our new Well-being food vouchers, which support those most at need with a food voucher of up to £100. For this year we were able to distribute, £5,000 of well-being food vouchers to 50 people most at need across Wales, in the past 12 months.

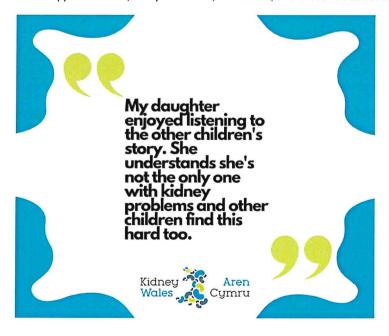
Our ability to support so many patients from the Kidney Community that are experiencing financial challenges, has only been able to take place due to the close working relationship that we have with the renal social workers across Wales.



In collaboration with Anglesey County Council, we have been able to distribute one off payments of £500, directly to cover energy bill costs for those who were receiving dialysis treatment. This has helped 35 Kidney patients, totalling £17,500. Through the work of our Patient Information and Support Manager individually supported over 50 patients from the Kidney Community. The cost-of-living crisis and general information and health advice were the two largest causes of support needed. 46% of the enquiries that we received were of people asking for financial support and advice, with a further 34% enquiring about information and advice related to their health.

We were also pleased to partner with the Tea Pot Trust, to create an online art therapy group was provided to support children and young people with kidney disease.

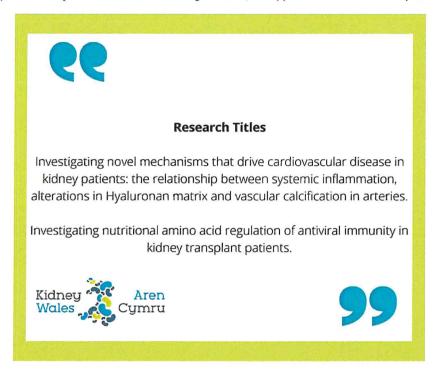
The project was co-developed with the Teapot Trust Art Therapy Project Manager, with the aim to help children and young people to achieve their full potential despite their medical condition. The project aimed to provide a safe place to help communication and help with emotional regulation, develop self-confidence, reduce anxiety, increase independence, build positive peer interaction and a support network, and provide fun, interactive, and creative activities.



4. Develop innovative programmes in research for the benefit of kidney patients in the Welsh community

Thanks to our supporters we were able to continue investing into much needed research for the Kidney Community.

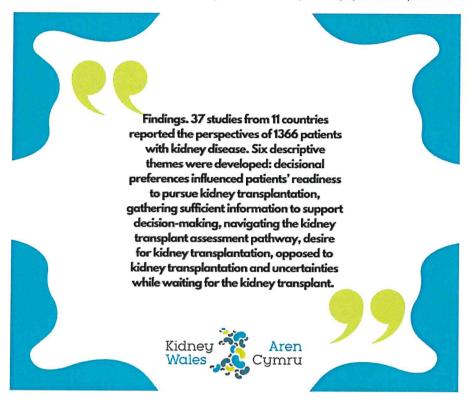
However, we made a strategic change to our research funding approach for 22/23, where for the first time we agreed a formal partnership with Kidney Research UK, committing £65,000, to support two PHD studentships in Wales.



As the year ended, Emma Jones PHD, who is leading the research, had completed a total of 27 semi structured interviews, and through these was already starting to identify themes to help better understand why people who are experiencing Kidney Failure make choices about not having a kidney transplant. In total 30 participants will be interviewed, before the analysis and write up phase begins. Early findings were to be presented at UK Kidney Week on 7th June.

As part of the PHD research Emma also conducted a synthesis entitled; Understanding people's decisions when choosing or declining a kidney transplant: a qualitative evidence synthesis. It is hoped the paper will be published in the BMJ.

In the year ahead we will...



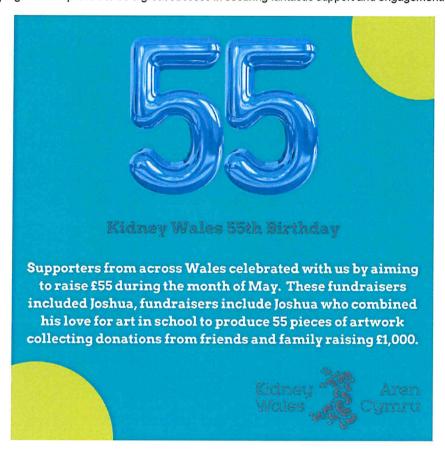
- · Launch a new Kidney Wales website.

- Build longer term engagement with our supporters, by continuing to provide excellent stewardship and developing stronger relationships with individuals and corporate organisations.

- Partner with Kidney Research UK, and NHS colleagues to deliver a series of online webinars, to increase organ donation amongst the South Asian communities.
- Partner with Diabetes Cymru, delivering an awareness campaign around the important of Urine ACR screening.
- · Continue to work with KCT group, delivering a WKD awareness campaign.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Fundraising

Throughout 22/23 we continued to see the impact of supporters new behaviours following the Covid-19 pandemic, as well as the new challenge of the cost of living crisis. Both of these factors continued to affect our event and community fundraising activities across the year. Due to the difficulty in recruiting fundraisers and event attendees, the need for innovative fundraising campaigns and focus on grant fundraising was more apparent than ever, and we focused on building upon the changes we started to implement the previous year.

Despite the challenges we faced, and some events being cancelled, Kidney Wales delivered a number of virtual and live fundraising campaigns which proved to be a great success in securing fantastic support and engagement. These included:

The passion of the Kidney Community to support Kidney Wales with fundraising activities continued to be demonstrated during the year. Collectively, despite the challenges faced, our supporters collectively raised over £22,000, through planning or taking on their own events and challenges on our behalf, which included tractor runs, card making, film nights, lamb jam festival and raffles just to name a few.

We are so grateful to have continued to receive significant support via donations in memory of loved ones with over £25,500 being raised. Over £8,000 of this in memory of our trustee Stewart who sadly passed away in September 2022. In his memory we will endeavour to use the income raised to support increased awareness of skin care for renal patients.

Despite a challenging year we were fortunate to receive some fantastic support from some of our corporate supporters which included a donation from NFU, Hughes Fforest Builders Merchants and Cobalt HR Limited. So that we continue to grow and develop, we also undertook a corporate mastery course to further develop our income generation opportunities and skills.



Once again, another standout area of fundraising during this financial year was grant fundraising. This was a new area of income generation for the charity since the pandemic, this financial year we wanted to improve upon the achievements of the year before. Through the dedication of increased planning, it has continued to grow from strength to strength, and we were able to secure over £70,000 in grant income this financial year.

Grant success included awards from Tesco Community Fund, The National Lottery Awards for All, One Stop Community Fund as well as our biggest grant yet. The National Lottery People and Places scheme where we were successful in our bid for £150,000 over 4 years developing the volunteer ambassador programme as well as hosting multiple information events annually for the kidney community.

We also secured our first grant from a pharmaceutical company, GSK for £16,175 of funding to help cover the remainder of the cost of our website redevelopment, as well as £5,000 towards our financial hardship grants to support patients most at need. Finally, we obtained our first council grant, £10,000 from Anglesey County council, which was used to support CKD patients living on Anglesey and receiving dialysis treatment, financially impacted by the cost-of-living crisis

In order to try and re-engage with our supporter base following a couple of years of disruption, we introduced supporter engagement sessions. An online session where we take the opportunity to demonstrate the impact of our work but also utilising this opportunity to share fundraising opportunities and learn from supporters directly

Financial position

We raise money in many different ways, the Charity continues to receive funds from many different sources, and for this year we have diversified our funding streams more than ever. Generally, most of the funds raised are generated from events held by the charity, however this year we have worked hard to bring more grant funding income into the organisation, to support projects and core roles.

Our total income for the year amounted to £543,898 (2022-£303,354), an increase on the previous year. The main sources of income for the Charity include general donations, grants, legacies, fundraising events, and Gift Aid.

Donations for the year totalled £43,756 which is an increase from previous years (2022 - £22,148).

The Charity benefited from £341,184 of legacy gifts which was an increase from last year (2022 - £103,358)

Expenditure for the year is £340,888 up from last years (2022 - £326,991). We have tried to act proactively and cut overhead costs where possible. This includes the termination of supplier contracts, reducing the amount of paid advertising, using grants to replace laptops, and changing our working environment and habits to reduce charity costs.

Overall, Kidney Wales charity ran at a profit of £203,010, compared to a deficit of £23,637 in 2022. This has resulted in a carried forward value of reserves of £919,202.

Investment policy and objectives

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit. The trustees have considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds, and they believe that holding funds in deposit accounts meets their requirements to generate income without seriously restricting access to funds in the medium term.

In light of the Coronavirus pandemic, and the consequential impact on the fundraising environment for all charities, the trustees include at every Board meeting a review of cash flows for three years, in order to assess whether the charity remains a going concern. Changes continue to be made during the 22/23 financial year to minimise expenditure during this difficult financial period and help sustainability of the organisation.

Reserves policy

The trustees are aware that the Charity must monitor closely changes in the economic environment and make appropriate responses to safeguard its own financial position. The Charity continues to strive to make the best possible use of all incoming resources to ensure that it is able to deliver upon its stated objectives.

The reserves policy of Kidney Wales recognises that we hold reserves to ensure we can manage:

- Financial impact of risk
- Working capital
- Contractual obligations research, supplier contracts restricted and designated funds.

To ensure that there is no significant disruption to our charitable activities, holding appropriate reserves will enable Kidney Wales to respond to any unforeseen.

reduction in income, or additional expenditure. We have based our projections for the appropriate number of reserves we require on the basis that the reserves in our target range would provide short-term until long-term solutions can be established. A detailed review of the financial risks we face is monitored on an ongoing basis, within the quarterly Finance and Governance Subcommittee meetings. Our assessments on the possible financial impact of those risks have been incorporated into the reserves range we have calculated.

The target range for reserves is > 9 months. This will allow for Kidney Wales to more than meet the minimum advised by the Charity Commission without having to notify them of significant incident, such as risk of controlled closure. The Board will be advised as part of the subcommittee RAG guidance. Free reserves of the charity at year-end totalled £892,317, which based on current year expenditure, is 31 months cover, meaning reserves are in excess of targeted range.

The Board of Trustees considers this target range provides sufficient flexibility in the context of operational requirements, for Kidney Wales and its beneficiaries. Restricted funds would be highlighted as part of this. There will therefore be:

- Free reserve funds
- Designated funds
- Restricted funds

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, registered number 02268003, and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, and a charity registered with the Charity Commission, number 700396.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

All directors are trustees. A trustee can propose the appointment of a trustee. On a proposal, a vote shall be taken, and approval shall be obtained through a simple majority.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are provided with an induction pack and are given initial training by the Managing Director and further training as and when required.

Organisational structure

Kidney Wales is a pan Wales organisation, but is administered from its office in Cardiff, with one member of staff being based in North Wales.

During 22/23 this team comprised of the Managing Director, Patient Information & Support Manager, Finance & Operations Manager, Income Generation & Events Manager, Communications Officer and Volunteer Officer.

Key management remuneration

Key management remuneration is set as part of the budget approval process confirmed by the trustees through the People & Culture Sub Committee. The salaries are set taking into account the level of responsibility, benchmarking against salaries paid in similar organisations and the current rate of inflation.

Risk management

The trustees have complied with their duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. assurance against fraud and error.

REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE MEMBERS OF KIDNEY WALES CHARITY

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Kidney Wales Charity (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 March 2023 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 March 2023 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

Kidney Wales Charity is a registered charity and private company limited by guarantee having no share capital, incorporated in Wales in the United Kingdom. The registered office is 2 Radnor Court, 256 Cowbridge Road East, Cardiff, CF5 1GZ. The nature of the company's operations and principal activities is disclosed within the Report of the Trustees.

The financial statements are presented in Sterling (\mathfrak{L}) , the company's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

There have been no material departures from Financial Reporting Standard 102.

Going concern

No material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt upon the entity's ability to continue as a going concern exist.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

This includes capital grants.

Donations and legacies income includes donations, gifts and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature are recognised where there is entitlement, probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Such income is only deferred when the donor specifies it must be used in future accounting periods or the donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Other trading activities income is recognised as the related services are provided and there is entitlement, probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Income is deferred when the amounts received are in advance of the delivery of the service or event to which it relates.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Raising funds costs includes all expenditure incurred by the charity to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of fundraising activities, events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature to support them.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Expenditure

Support costs are those costs that, whilst necessary to deliver an activity, do not themselves produce or constitute the output of the charitable activity. This includes governance costs which are those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the accountancy fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity as well as a proportion of salaries based on an approximation of time spent in this area.

Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in the costs relating to that activity. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to a specific activity they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resource.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of the ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

The benefits of lease incentives are recognised in the profit and loss account over the lease period.

Intangibles

Intangibles are capitalised at cost and amortisation is provided at the following annual rates to write the assets off over their estimated useful life.

Computer software

- Straight line over 3 years

Trademark

- Straight line over 10 years

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Improvements to property Fixtures and fittings

Straight line over 3 years

Straight line over 3 years

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost. Individual assets costing £500 or more are capitalised.

Fund structure

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the board for particular purposes.

Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure, which meets these criteria, is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of support and governance costs.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity contributes to the NEST workplace pension scheme which is a defined contribution scheme. The annual contributions payable are charged to the statement of financial activities incorporating the income and expenditure account.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due and prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Awards for All (National Lottery) - Project funding Digitalising our community which includes core costs of our communications officer for 12 months as well as website development.

WCVA TSRF - This grant was a resilience fund from Welsh Government administered by the WCVA to help with the effects of the pandemic to help charities survive. The application was based on the core salaries of two roles (3 days per week) for a 12 month period undergoing our usual charitable activity within these roles.

Anglesey Project - The funding from Isle of Anglesey County Council was to support CKD patients living on Anglesey financially impacted by the cost-of-living crisis. This financial aid provided helped cover energy bills costs for patients.

Masonic Benevolent Fund of South Wales - The funding to purchase 1,000 fistula caps for members of the Welsh Kidney Community.

Groundwork (Tesco) - The funding of an 8 week virtual art therapy course in conjunction with Tea Pot Trust for children living with kidney disease.

Groundwork (OneStop) - The funding of an 8 week virtual art therapy course in conjunction with TeaPot Trust for children living with kidney disease.

GSK - The funding from GSK UK Pharmaceuticals for £16,175 helped fund the remainder of the cost of our website redevelopment as well as £5,000 towards our financial hardship grants provided for patients.

22. EMPLOYEE BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS

The charity contributes to the NEST workplace pension scheme which is a defined contribution scheme. The pension costs charge for the year represents contributions payable by the charity to the scheme and amounted to £3,513 (2022: £3,604). At the year end there were outstanding contributions of £700 (2022 - £750).

23. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

There were no related party transactions for the year end 31 March 2023 or the for the year ended 31 March 2022.

24. CONTINGENT ASSET

At the 31 March 2023 the charity had received notification of entitlement to a share of a further 1 legacy. However, as the monetary value of the legacy cannot be measured reliably no income has been recognised in these financial statements. Legacies will be recognised as income when the criteria for income recognition are met.
