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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Charity's objects, as stated in the governing documents, are to relieve in cases of need of persons resident in Wales (and elsewhere in Britain as the directors from time to time decide) who are suffering from a renal disease or diseases by the promotion, provision maintenance and improvement of renal units in hospitals, schools of medicine and universities by the provision therein or in connection therewith of any equipment, laboratories, facilities or personnel whatsoever calculated to relieve such persons and by the promotion of medical research into renal and other diseases.

Our Mission

The objectives for our work are to generate and use diverse resources sustainably and responsibly to:

- Deliver education and awareness raising activity.
- Work in partnership with other organisations to enhance the experience and well-being of the kidney community.
- Invest our funds in support services and enhancing facilities and equipment to add value to statutory funding and improve patient care and well-being.
- Develop innovative programmes in research for the benefit of kidney patients in the Welsh community.

Principal activities, objectives and policies

The charitable objects of Kidney Wales are the relief of the physical and mental health of persons who are suffering from renal disease or diseases in Wales or elsewhere in Great Britain as the Trustees from time to time decide.

With the significant help of our supporters, Kidney Wales Charity helps patients by:

- The promotion, provision, maintenance and improvement of renal units in hospitals and kidney transplant units, schools of medicine, universities and such other locations as the Trustees may from time to time decide and the provision therein or in connection therewith of any equipment, laboratories, facilities or other resources as may be require.
- Providing support, education and practical advice.
- Advancing the education of the general public in all areas relating to renal diseases.
- The Promotion or provision of other effective care and support for people who are affected by rental diseases.

Public benefit

The trustees reviewed the vision and mission statements during 2019/20 to bring a tighter strategic focus to our work, and these were confirmed at the AGM in November 2020. We referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our vision and mission and in planning future activities thus ensuring that it continues in its purpose of promoting excellence in renal research, treatment, education and the support of patients and families in Wales. During 2020, the activities of the charity were reviewed against the mission statements and an impact report was produced for 2019/20. A strategic review was undertaken from January to April, which informed the creation of an operational plan for the new financial year of 2020/21, which must now be reviewed through a 'post COVID' lens for 2021/22.

Volunteers

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic and the cancellation of events and fundraising activities volunteer opportunities were minimal throughout the year. Two interns from the University of South Wales were recruited for a 10 week period, and some individual fundraising volunteers / committee's continued their roles working within Government Guidelines. 35 volunteers supported a variety of roles throughout the year including hosting virtual information sessions relating to the pandemic as well as supporting with income generation.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

We have throughout the year worked with partners to highlight the effect of kidney disease on the lives of those living with CKD and their families. The vast majority of people in Wales do not know that diabetes and high blood pressure cause CKD which can lead to kidney failure needing dialysis and transplantation. With an understanding of how the kidneys function we aim to help keep the kidneys in good working order, help with early diagnosis and treatment, so that individuals can slow or stop the progression of CKD. Our activities during this year included:

With the help of Moondance Foundation, Kidney Wales launched a self-care wellbeing voucher scheme for patients under hospital care supporting the community as we begun to transition out of the lockdown periods and shielding was lifted 591 self-care wellbeing vouchers were awarded to 15 patients (the project will continue in 2021/2022 to the value of £5,000).

During the year we saw an increase in requests for Financial Assistance. Mainly because of the effect of Covid-19 on Renal patients and their need to self-isolate. A total of £12,192 of Finance Assistance Grants were awarded to 43 patients. This Grants fall under 5 main categories, Food Vouchers, Household goods, Household Repairs, Rent/Bills and Technology.

Due to the vulnerability of Chronic Kidney Patients during the Covid-19 pandemic, Kidney Wales saw an increase in the levels of queries received specifically regarding the virus. Kidney Wales worked in collaboration with the Welsh Renal network and other Kidney Charities to gather, comprehend and present the guidance and requirements to the Kidney Community in a clear concise way ensuring that the community were prepared for All aspects of the pandemic. From 1st April 2020 to 31 March 123 direct patient enquiries were responded to. A closed Facebook Group, the Kidney Wales Community, was also set up to share Covid-19 related information and enable kidney patients to connect. The charity also collaborated with a Transplant Surgeon from the University Hospital of Wales to host five Facebook Live events, to provide information and to respond to questions submitted by patients.

12 Covid-19 newsletters for kidney patients were published, with partners from the Kidney Care UK, Paul Popham Fund, Welsh Kidney Research Unit and Welsh Renal Clinical Network ensuring the community was fully informed of all aspects of the pandemic and how they could keep themselves safe during this time. Newsletters were publicised on the charity's websites, and hard copies sent to each dialysis unit for patients to take away.

Three Virtual Conferences were held in collaboration with Kidney Care UK and Paul Popham Fund, which were attended by 212 participants. Providing up to date information, guidance specifically relating to the Kidney Community and the opportunity to hear from experts in the patients' health field was key throughout the Pandemic giving the community the chance to gather, process and come to a personal decision on their choices during the pandemic.

A further 2,000 life-saving fistula caps were supplied to dialysis units across Wales. The charity also continued to fund the pioneering Child Psychologist role at the Children's Kidney Centre at the University Hospital of Wales.

During the early stages of the Covid-19 pandemic, whilst the guidance around wearing face coverings was vague Kidney patients were encouraged by the Welsh Renal Clinical Network to wear a face covering whilst travelling to and from clinical appointments and if they were going outside. In response to this, Kidney Wales introduced a branded 3 layered re-usable face covering, with the support of the Welsh Renal Clinical Network. We engaged the community with the design of the face covering, allowing our social media followers to vote on their preferred design which built the awareness around the campaign.

There are around 4,000 kidney patients in Wales who are considered as highly vulnerable who were shielding throughout the pandemic. Between 1 April 2020 and 31 March 2021, we distributed 3,100 face coverings to patients and their families living with Chronic Kidney Disease. A Patient under hospital care was able to order one covering free of charge and were able to order 3 additionally for family members for a donation to the charity. Each face covering was sent out with guidance on how to wear the face covering correctly and in which settings it should be worn along with a note from Kidney Wales.

Within our first order of 2,000 face coverings, the majority was sent out in the post directly to the kidney community with a small number being sent to kidney healthcare teams to distribute within their units. Following the success of the campaign, and the demand for more face coverings to become available particularly due to face coverings becoming a legal requirement a further 3,000 face coverings were ordered, and the distribution continued.

Alongside the face covering distribution we were able to run a fundraising campaign which proved to be a success with corporate and individual donations helping deliver this project for the Kidney Community.

Live Q&A events were delivered for patients and families throughout the year answering patient queries about the pandemic, their health, the vaccine and how these uncertain times were impacting on other areas of life including their mental wellbeing and concerns around financial implications of shielding. These sessions took place within our Kidney Wales Community Facebook group, where the community had the opportunity to submit their questions to the experts prior to the live session. They were also uploaded to you tube following the live event, where it could be re watched at any time. Across all 8 sessions they were viewed 4,359 times.

Kidney Wales Charity fully recognises the validity of all potential research areas in the field of kidney disease, from basic science (laboratory) projects to qualitative clinical research (such as patient surveys). Consequently, we do not differentiate between different areas of research for the purposes of funding and will consider funding research applications which propose to address fundamental questions about any aspect of kidney disease. The quality of the proposal will be assessed through the research committee and commissioned external peer reviewers, who are experts in the field relevant to the grant that they are asked to assess.

Kidney Wales is committed to supporting high quality research projects that are based in Wales and/or have investigators and collaborators that are based in Wales or have strong links with Wales. Where research is funded for projects that will be based outside Wales, there is a requirement that the applicants demonstrate how the work that they propose will benefit the people of Wales.

We also work closely with the Welsh Kidney Research Unit (WKRU) to raise awareness of the latest developments in clinical and associated psycho-social care for patients, as well as to promote opportunities for patients to be involved in research. Two of the key studies this year have been the Dialysis Options and Choices and Pregnancy Choices studies, led by the WKRU, in which Kidney Wales promoted and facilitated the involvement of patients and families.

Investment has been committed to 5 research projects from 2020-2023:

- Covid-19 Immune Response and Vaccine Efficacy in Patients with Renal Disease and/or Transplantation (£15,028).
- o Covid-19 Vaccine Research Fund (In collaboration with Kidney Research UK, NKF & PKD).
- Human Cytomegalovirus (HCMV) Encoded Interleukin-10 (vIL-10): Investigating the Immunomodulatory Effects of vIL-10 and its Suitability as a Novel Marker of Viral Reactivation in Kidney Transplant Patients (Cardiff Metropolitan £16,500 2019-2022)
- o PhD Research on self- management for Young Adults (Swansea University £30,000 2019-2022)
- 'Why do people say 'no' to a kidney transplant? Understanding patient decision making and choice'. (Bangor University £12,000 2020-2022)

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position Total income for the year amounted to £599,173 (2020 - £608,510)

Kidney Wales Charity continues to receive funds from many different channels. Generally, the majority of the funds raised are generated from events held by the charity. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19 these events had to be cancelled and redeveloped into virtual events to ensure important funds were still being raised.

Kidney Wales Charity received £43,682 through donations during the year which is an increase from previous years. This was due to our proactive approach during Covid-19, understanding that our main income streams would be highly affected during the Lockdown period of the Pandemic and reaching out to our supporters for donations to help us continue our work with Kidney Patients during the crisis.

Other trading activities totalled £155,818 for the year down from £419,346 in the previous year. Cardiff 10K income was down by 73% and 'other events' income was down by 49% on previous years, with a slight increase in Walk for Life income. Kidney Wales continued to generate some income through these events by turning them into Virtual events or asking entries for the Cardiff 10K to donate their entry fee to help fund the charity through the Pandemic.

The Charity benefited from £355,371 of legacy gifts which was an increased from last year (2020 - £159,660)

Kidney Wales Charity was also successful in a grant request to Moondance (£5,000), which allowed us to supply patients with Wellness Vouchers during Covid-19 as well as the Job retention Scheme (£39,206) run by the Government in response to the Covid-19 Pandemic.

Expenditure for the year was down from 2020. This was mainly due to reduced costs from postponing the Cardiff 10K before most of the expenditure was committed to. This proactive response to the Pandemic ensured that the financial impact on the charity for cancelling the event was reduced. Cost of the Cardiff 10k in 2021 was £50,190 against £210,185 in 2020.

There were also savings through the year due to a restructure which took place in October 2020, this resulted in a redundancy of 3 members of staff and the remining staff being reinstated in newly created rolls. This created a reduction of 22% on staffing costs for the year. The office running costs were also reviewed and renegotiated, resulting in further cost savings.

Overall Kidney Wales Charity ran at profit of £142,703 compared to a deficit of £61,663 in 2020. This has resulted in a carried forward value of reserves of £739,829.

Investment policy and objectives

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit. The trustees have considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds, and they believe that holding funds in deposit accounts meets their requirements to generate income without seriously restricting access to funds in the medium term.

In light of the Coronavirus pandemic, and the consequential impact on the fundraising environment for all charities, the trustees include at every Board meeting a review of cash flows for three years, in order to assess whether the charity remains a going concern. Changes have been made during the 2020/21 financial year to re-structure the organisation and reduce office space, to minimise expenditure during this difficult financial period, and help sustainability of the organisation.

Reserves policy

The trustees are aware that the Charity must monitor closely changes in the economic environment and make appropriate responses to safeguard its own financial position. The Charity continues to strive to make the best possible use of all incoming resources to ensure that it is able to deliver upon its stated objectives.

The reserves policy of Kidney Wales recognises that we hold reserves to ensure we can manage:

- Financial impact of risk

- Working capital

- Contractual obligations - research, supplier contracts restricted and designated funds.

To ensure that there is no significant disruption to our charitable activities, holding appropriate reserves will enable Kidney Wales to respond to any unforeseen reduction in income, or additional expenditure. We have based our projections for the appropriate amount of reserves we require on the basis that the reserves in our target range would provide short-term until long-term solutions can be established. A detailed review of the financial risks we face is monitored on an ongoing basis, within the quarterly Finance and Governance Subcommittee meetings. Our assessments on the possible financial impact of those risks have been incorporated into the reserves range we have calculated.

The target range for reserves is > 14 months. This will allow for Kidney Wales to more than meet the minimum advised by the Charity Commission without having to notify them of significant incident, such as risk of controlled closure. The Board will be advised as part of the subcommittee RAG guidance.

The Board of Trustees considers this target range provides sufficient flexibility in the context of operational requirements, for Kidney Wales and its beneficiaries. Restricted funds would be highlighted as part of this. There will therefore be:

- Free reserve funds
- Designated funds
- Restricted funds

Fundraising

With the real effects of the Covid-19 pandemic coming to light as we entered the 20/21 financial year, as predicted we saw a significant impact across all areas of events & fundraising. Events were cancelled and gatherings prohibited resulting in a prompt response in adapting to current regulations and the introduction of innovative fundraising campaigns.

Kidney Wales launched a number of virtual fundraising campaigns which proved to be a great success securing fantastic support and engagement.

These included:

- The 2.6 Challenge with over 35 participants taking on their own personal challenges.
- Virtual Walk for Life over 150 walkers took part virtually in their own towns and cities within government guidelines and restrictions
- The Virtual Cardiff 10K 90 runners took part in the virtual race, including a group from Penarth Cricket Club
- Santa Drop Our only live event of the year was a charity Abseil from Newport Transporter Bridge with 13 abseilers recruited raising an incredible amount which included matched funding.
- Virtual Tea Party campaign remained a good fundraiser
- Face covering campaign where we received general & corporate donations in support of our Face Covering campaign.

The desire of our Kidney Community to support Kidney Wales was demonstrated early in the pandemic with support for the above campaigns, but also via their own methods of fundraising. We witnessed creativity in raising money that we have never seen before. Utilising skills and hobbies to engage with friends and family whilst raising vital funds for charity in doing so. These activities included live virtual piano sessions and tribute evenings, virtual quiz via zoom, creating and selling face coverings & bags, Facebook fundraisers, virtual runs / walks and cycles at home or locally, weightlifting challenges, afternoon tea boxes produced just to name a few.

Despite a challenging year we were fortunate to receive some fantastic support from our Corporate supporters which included the hosting of a socially distanced Captains Day at Cardiff Golf Club, a 5K virtual run organised by Welsh Athletics, the closing of our yearlong partnership with Marks and Spencer and many donations in support of our ongoing work throughout the pandemic from ongoing supporters of the charity Cardiff Met & NFU Mutual Bridgend & Swansea.

Despite limitations on numbers at funerals, we continue to be grateful to have received significant support via donations in memory of loved ones. The Porthcawl Fundraising Committee kindly donated a sum of money in memory of their Vice Chair Judith French, who was a patient at the Transplant Unit at UHW. Judith was passionate about fundraising for Kidney Wales and helped organise many events over the years raising thousands of pounds. On advice from the Transplant & Nephrology Team, an additional blood pressure monitor was purchased to improve the experience of patients during treatment.

FUTURE PLANS

Strategic goals and objectives

One of the key tasks for the new Managing Director, employed in January 2020, was to review the operations and engage with key stakeholders to understand how the current work of Kidney Wales fits in the bigger picture of support for the kidney community in Wales. The initial findings were discussed by trustees in April 2020 and need to be reviewed through a 'post COVID' lens.

It is still impossible to predict at this stage what the medium to long term impacts of Coronavirus will be on society at large and vulnerable members of our community within it; on how the NHS and social care operate in future; and on the operating environment for charities, including how and what we fundraise for. However, it is also impossible to ignore in the context of reviewing our strategic direction. We know that it will shape what we do and how we do it.

During the pandemic, there has been a shift to delivering information and guidance for patients and families virtually, rather than face to face, including virtual events and Q&A sessions, and we expect this to continue into 21/22.

Future spending will be aligned to delivering our vision and mission and will be guided by the following principles:

1. Deliver education and awareness raising activity.

We will continue to deliver education and awareness raising activity for the kidney community through 21/22. We will continue to publish up to date web and social media content relevant to people with CKD. We will celebrate World Kidney Day (March 2022), with an online educational awareness session and raise awareness of positive stories of organ donors and recipients during Organ Donation Week (Sept 2021)

2. Work in partnership with other organisations to enhance the experience and well-being of the kidney community

During 21/22 we will look to build on the strong collaborative partnerships that have been developed during the Covid-19 pandemic, including Diabetes Cymru, Lupus UK and Daring to Dream.. Partnership working with the Renal Network, the Welsh Kidney Research Unit and other kidney charities has grown considerably during the pandemic, with key outputs including a hard copy newsletter for dialysis patients in unit and a virtual conference. Our collaboration brings tangible benefits to patients and families and is something we are working to grow further; future plans include a programme of virtual conferences and the promotion of awareness and understanding of the lived experience of patients amongst healthcare teams. We will also look to join the Kidney Charities Together group. The group is made up of communications professional representing some of the leading kidney charities and organisations across the country, including PKD Charity, Kidney Care UK, Kidney Research, UKKN and the NKF.

In 2018, Kidney Wales agreed proof of concept funding for a part time Psychologist post at the University Hospital of Wales to work within the Children's Kidney Centre (CKC). Initially the duration of the agreement was from 3rd December 2018 to 3rd December 2020, and in partnership with NHS Wales we have extended this 31st July 2021. We will work in partnership with the Renal Network and others to find a long-term sustainable way to fund this vital role.

3. Invest our funds in support services and enhancing facilities and equipment to add value to statutory funding and improve patient care and well-being

Our Patient Information and Support Manager will drive new initiatives for people living with kidney failure. External funding will be sought to deliver projects which provide targeted interventions for specific cohorts for example young adults who are in transition from paediatric to adult renal services, and to support people with advanced care planning. Through this role we will also continue to respond to enquiries from patients and families, signposting to specialist advice. As in previous years, Kidney Wales we will continue to work with Renal Social Workers, Psychologists and other health care professionals to provide urgent financial assistance for patients and families, something that is needed more than ever as we work our way through the Covid-19 pandemic. Emergency financial aid will continue to be provided to patients and families in the greatest need.

4. Develop innovative programmes in research for the benefit of kidney patients in the Welsh community

During 21/22 Kidney Wales will maintain our commitment to funding and publicising for ongoing research projects, including two headline commitments to funding two separate pieces of research into the effectiveness of the Covid-19 vaccine amongst kidney patients, particularly those on dialysis and with a transplant. We will also set aside additional investment to fund new innovative projects. Higher risk for CKD, or who may already have the disease but are unaware.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, registered number 02268003, and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, and a charity registered with the Charity Commission, number. 700396.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

All directors are trustees. A trustee can propose the appointment of a trustee. On a proposal, a vote shall be taken, and approval shall be obtained through a simple majority.

Organisational structure

The Charity is administered from its office in Cardiff. A team of employed staff and fundraisers broadly manages the fundraisers and voluntary fundraising committees based in towns throughout Wales. This team also organises a series of fundraising events throughout the year, and the monies raised through merchandising. The Charity's objects and principal activity consist of charitable fundraising and the provisions of those funds for renal research, care and education which is responsive to the needs of clinical institutions, patients and their families.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are provided with an induction pack and are given initial training by the Managing Director and further training as and when required.

Key management remuneration

Key management remuneration is set as part of the budget approval process confirmed by the trustees through the People & Culture Sub Committee. The salaries are set taking into account the level of responsibility, salaries paid in similar organisations and the current rate of inflation.

Risk management

The trustees have complied with their duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

Kidney Wales Charity is a registered charity and private company limited by guarantee having no share capital, incorporated in Wales in the United Kingdom. The registered office is 2 Radnor Court, 256 Cowbridge Road East, Cardiff, CF5 1GZ. The nature of the company's operations and principal activities is disclosed within the Report of the Trustees.

The financial statements are presented in Sterling (£), the company's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

There have been no material departures from Financial Reporting Standard 102.

Going concern

No material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt upon the entity's ability to continue as a going concern exist.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

This includes capital grants.

Donations and legacies income includes donations, gifts and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature are recognised where there is entitlement, probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Such income is only deferred when the donor specifies it must be used in future accounting periods or the donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Other trading activities income is recognised as the related services are provided and there is entitlement, probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Income is deferred when the amounts received are in advance of the delivery of the service or event to which it relates.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

It is not the policy of the charity to show income net of expenditure.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Raising funds costs includes all expenditure incurred by the charity to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of fundraising activities, events and non-charitable trading.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Expenditure

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature to support them.

Support costs are those costs that, whilst necessary to deliver an activity, do not themselves produce or constitute the output of the charitable activity. This includes governance costs which are those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the accountancy fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity as well as a proportion of salaries based on an approximation of time spent in this area.

Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in the costs relating to that activity. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to a specific activity they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resource.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of the ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

The benefits of lease incentives are recognised in the profit and loss account over the lease period.

Intangibles

Intangibles are capitalised at cost and amortisation is provided at the following annual rates to write the assets off over their estimated useful life.

Computer software	- Straight line over 3 years
Trademark	- Straight line over 10 years

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Improvements to property	-	Straight line over 3 years
Fixtures and fittings	-	Straight line over 3 years

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost. Individual assets costing £500 or more are capitalised.

Fund structure

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the board for particular purposes.

Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure, which meets these criteria, is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of support and governance costs.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity contributes to the NEST workplace pension scheme which is a defined contribution scheme. The annual contributions payable are charged to the statement of financial activities incorporating the income and expenditure account.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due and prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.
